During the last half year, some of your Committee, the Working Parties, individual volunteers, friends and helpers have taken restoration some further stages nearer to steaming the pumping engine. A whole history is covered by these few words, some of which is recorded in the Trust Log book now being kept.

Two regular workers were down in the pit whilst a casual worker hauled on the pulleys to remove the cover of the pump casing in the hotwell next to the condenser. As it came away, revealing about 30 gallons of liquid that had been there since before 1940, Harry looks across it saying, "This is distilled water you know Frank".

Briefly, the vertical boiler is in position with its chimney erected through the roof, and the removable archway aperture now protected by doors and frame. The engine is promised to be ready by the time the boiler and working party under the acting leadership of the Chairman has steam up, and the scoop wheel, although not yet completely restored, is ready now for being driven.

One Working Party Leader, who often does more to help others than himself, was one day leaning over the scoop wheel when his cheque book fell out of his pocket and down into the lower reaches of the raceway. Fortunately, it was recovered for its special value as not only an account book, but for various key plans, drawings, and specifications thereon and maybe even a number of hot tips.

Open Days have produced much the same profits as last year, i.e. not many visitors, far too few stewards, and a little hard earned cash, but a lot of genuine interest.

A small piece of history was made on 14th June, 1975 when we had our first known visitor in a Rolls Royce: the fact it was circa 1928 with one rear door off and a sheet tied over the vacancy in no way lessened the pride and pleasure.

Almost without exception, all visitors say, "Get steaming and we will come again". We have promised them we will for next season, and must keep that promise regardless.

Believe it or not, but it is true, one of the Committee when taking turn for Open Day stewarding, travels over 20 miles by bicycle and in a sun suit too.

Individual visitors and parties by special arrangement during the working week, when flying may be taking place from RAF Coningsby, are strongly recommended to take simple precautions against being exposed to sudden excessive noise.
